Piping Foundation Students Graduating



Three Piping Foundation students received their certificates on April 1, 2016.

Keane Tait, Adam Tait and Jeremy Johnson-Nisyok started the 18 week course on November 16, 2015 at the UA Piping Industry College in Terrace.

All 3 of them passed with very good grades and attendance.

In a circle discussion with the 8 Aboriginal Opportunities for Trades Upgrading (AOTU) students currently at the trade school, Keane said that you should focus on Math and Physics for any students that want to pursue a trades program.

Any way that you can familiarize yourself with associated tools that go along with it can really help you.

You should also prepare yourself with the hazards and dangers of the occupation that you eventually choose and build your experience to your occupation.

Keane got a part-time job as a HAZMAT and demolition work and he said that's the most dangerous job you can do. He worked with oxy acetylene torches and explosive materials and it really helped him when he came back in the shop.

Knowing when to crack a joke to help lighten the mood when you're on the job really helps too.

Jeremy said listen to your instructors and especially the students because one of them may be able to help you in a course that you're struggling with.

Adam said he wasn't that good at Math when he started out in the program but now he's pretty confi-

dent in it.

He said also that this is the place for trades, the instructors know their stuff and you get a different instructor for every trade so you don't get bored listening to one instructor all day.

It's mostly Math in all the trades so upgrade your Math skills before you get to this level it will help you.

Attendance is also very important. If you miss one day it like missing a whole week's work.

Jeremy said that if you miss out on learning job safety then you get left out in the class because you don't know what the safety precautions are.

Keane said you learn things in succession so you have to be there every day or else you will get left behind. You will be asking a lot of questions and you will be slowing the class down.

We did a whole day on safety precautions before we went into the welding shop.

If you missed that day on safety the rest of your class won't trust you because you don't know the safety precautions.

What if you have to work beside them and he blows everyone up because he or she doesn't know the safety precautions?

Attendance to every class is critical. Establishing good attendance habits in class will help you get a good job and is a really good habit to get into.

We found it useful to combine the graduating Piping Foundation students with the AOTU students because the graduating students could pass on what they've learned about themselves and the course. It gives the AOTU students inspiration and encouragement.

One of the AOTU students stated the course jumps back and forth and he found that challenging because he found it hard to focus.

Please take note of the new finish date of May 5, 2016. It starts at 10:00 am on the first day.


The Special Assembly will be 4 days long this year.

Damen Bell-Holter held a five day basketball camp for kids aged 6 – 12 years and 13 years and up. The basketball camp is called Bless 2 Bless and it finished on Sunday, April 24, 2016.

About 20 kids showed up for the first session on Wednesday and 11 for the older group.

Damen put them through basic fundamentals of basketball.

He also tells the kids that's it not just about basketball and that there's a lot more out there.

Too many kids get stuck in a community because they're scared to get out there and see the world.

Damen is an American Indian who grew up in a small community of about 300 people.

He is from Hydaburg Alaska he has played professional basketball with the Boston Celtics D league team when he first came out of school.

Last year he played with Istanbul in Turkey and this year is playing professional basketball with Finland

In the off-season he runs this basketball camp for kids and young people.

Damen has played basketball in the All-Native Tournament for the Hydaburg seniors in 2008.

The Internet, TV and video games take up most of the youth today in small communities. Every community is like this, the kids are too distracted.

The youth don't understand the work ethic to make it in college or professional basketball.

Damen focusses on the fundamentals.

Everything is high speed or game speed. That's how you get better.
